Onwards and upwards

The past year has seen unprecedented growth at the Cavalier Centre. Participation is up by over 50%, we've opened the new Little Bradbury learning barn, planted a sensory garden and made big improvements to the site. We've gained a 5^{*} Riding School Licence and are a Highly Commended BHS Approved Centre in all areas of our work.

The uplift in people taking part is incredible and just shows that the work we're doing is both valuable and appreciated.



Our year at a glance

The Centre is open seven days a week and its wide range of programmes are attracting participants from three years old (for hippotherapy) to people in their nineties who enjoyed Tea With A Pony.

Not only have we continued with our regular RDA (Riding for the Disabled Association) Riding, Carriage Driving, and Vaulting sessions, we've also introduced the British Horse Society's Changing Lives Through Horses programme. This new course runs alongside our STEPS eight-week confidence building programme, Stable Relationships – a 12-week, one-to-one emotional intelligence course, At Home with Horses for people with refugee backgrounds, and our much loved Tea With A Pony and Quiet Time With A Pony sessions as well as holiday activities.

Our impact

Making a difference in many different ways

With our incredible volunteers, coaches and team members we've delivered:

- 1,079 RDA Riding sessions
- 424 RDA Carriage Driving sessions
- 49 STEPS sessions to 23 people
- 12 Stable Relationships 12-week courses
- 62 Non-ridden equine sessions
- 86 Pony Care sessions
- 85 Changing Lives Through Horses sessions
- 4 Inclusive sports days for 180 participants

But behind those statistics are individual stories of lives transformed, confidence built, and happiness found. Every day we hear our participants and volunteers talk about what the Cavalier Centre means to them and how it's their "happy place".

With encouragement our participants try new activities, push themselves out of their comfort zone and compete in RDA Regional and National Championships – often coming home with rosettes and trophies to demonstrate their achievements.

One participant's parent said that their daughter loved coming to the Centre and has learned a lot about herself and well as gaining in confidence.





It's those kinds of comments that not only demonstrate the importance of the work we do, but how much our horses and ponies do in terms of empowering people to achieve more than they think they can.

Whether it's attending a carers' wellbeing retreat, learning to groom in a Pony Care session, or discovering what it means to set boundaries as a young person, we continue to dedicate ourselves to removing barriers and delivering meaningful equine-related activities to everyone.

The Cavalier Centre is truly a place where horses make the difference.
